
An exceedingly difficult

Instructions: Guess the words defined by the cryptic clues (words vary in length from three to nine letters), then enter them in the grid one after another in the same order as their clues, starting in the upper left corner. Across words that don't end at the right margin continue on the next line, and down words that don't end at the bottom margin continue in the next column. Across words and down words don't always mesh properly. Specifically, one letter that occurs in eight across words and six down words should not be entered in the grid at all. Instead, enter the letters of the crossing words that don't mesh. By the way, those seven blacked-out squares in the middle of the grid aren't intended to mark word endings. Let words straddle them as necessary.
