I dropped some insurance and financial terms into the clues to make it more suitable for *Contingencies*.

There are no unusual words, and everything is playable in

Scrabble. There's one proper noun, which occurs as one side of a double definition, but the other side is a regular word. Ignore punctuation, which is designed to confuse.


